Extravagant

Matthew 5:1-10 When Jesus saw his ministry drawing huge crowds, he climbed a hillside. Those who were apprenticed to him, the committed, climbed with him. Arriving at a quiet place, he sat down and taught his climbing companions. This is what he said: "You're blessed when you're at the end of your rope. With less of you there is more of God and his rule. "You're blessed when you feel you've lost what is most dear to you. Only then can you be embraced by the One most dear to you. "You're blessed when you're content with just who you are—no more, no less. That's the moment you find yourselves proud owners of everything that can't be bought. "You're blessed when you've worked up a good appetite for God. He's food and drink in the best meal you'll ever eat. "You're blessed when you care. At the moment of being 'care-full,' you find yourselves cared for. "You're blessed when you get your inside world—your mind and heart—put right. Then you can see God in the outside world. "You're blessed when you can show people how to cooperate instead of compete or fight. That's when you discover who you really are, and your place in God's family. "You're blessed when your commitment to God provokes persecution. The persecution drives you even deeper into God's kingdom. "Not only that—count yourselves blessed every time people put you down or throw you out or speak lies about you to discredit me. What it means is that the truth is too close for comfort and they are uncomfortable. You can be glad when that happens—give a cheer, even!—for though they don't like it, I do! And all heaven applauds. And know that you are in good company. My prophets and witnesses have always gotten into this kind of trouble. (The Message)

We typically think of the above scripture as The Beatitudes, when Jesus describes all the ways Christians can be blessed during times of trouble. The Message puts a different spin on these verses. It doesn't emphasize how God helps us during difficult times, it stresses that nothing is more important than being closer in touch with Him.

Any disaster, threat, danger, or illness isn't nearly as important as we tend to think they are. Such things drive us closer to God, which pales in comparison to whatever problems we are forced to endure.

Jesus is actually telling us to be glad when things go wrong and we are at our wit's end.

That's when we are nearest to him. The difficulties are worth it.






Piano & Organ Concert
