

ANote from Your Pastor

February, 2025

On January 26, 2025 we held a Congregational Meeting to review and approve the 2025 budget for Northwest Christian Church. While finances and numbers are just one measure of the work of the church, at this time, we can feel very good about this measure. We have a good story to tell.

In 2024 we passed a deficit budget. We passed it, stepping out in faith that we would make the numbers work and would find a way to cover the shortfall. At that time, the balance in our General Fund was extremely low. Through our Close the Gap campaign, combined with a generous matching gift, we raised the funds to more than offset the deficit in the budget. And by the end of 2024, our General Fund balance was over \$50,000.

We considered several options for lowering our monthly mortgage payments. Our Finance Team negotiated an Interest Only payment for a year, giving us time to investigate other possibilities. Everything was on the table for discussion — from refinancing to selling all or parts of our building or land. A core of dedicated people researched and met with outside consultants to determine if any of these solutions would meet our goal while still allowing us to meet our needs and continue our mission and ministry.

In the meantime, giving increased. Over the course of this year, we've seen an increase in the number of giving units, in the amount pledged, and in the actual amount given. Other efforts have increased building usage.

As the year progressed, it became clear to the Finance Team that we would not need to sell any of our building or property to pay the mortgage. By the end of the year, it was determined that we do not need to refinance at time. And a generous donation has decreased our outstanding mortgage amount by \$70,000. That balance now stands at just over \$500,000.

Our 2025 budget does again have a deficit. However, built into that budget is a full monthly mortgage payment, staff salary increases, and a return to budget line items supporting the missions of our church. And our current General Fund balance more than covers that deficit if needed.

Thank You, Northwest Christian Church members for faithfully investing in and contributing to the ministry and mission of our church. We are on a path to greater financial stability. And as we continue down that path, imagine how we might serve God in our neighborhood and our world if our financial resources don't consume as much of our attention.

T've always thought that a church should have one big audacious goal every year — a goal that takes your breath away and could change lives if it was accomplished. What if our 2025 goal was to eliminate our mortgage? Imagine looking at our income and being able to allocate those funds toward greater giving to our existing partners, beginning new mission initiatives, and sharing our gifts more freely to God's glory! What a story that would be. May it be so.

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Extravagant Generosity

2 Corinthians 9:6-8 Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work.

When we look at our own finances, particularly in difficult economic times, cheerfulness is not usually our first reaction. Often our reaction is exceedingly neutral. If our

financial situation is not good, the typical reaction is anxiety. Good cheer never enters into our experience.

Good cheer happens when we give to help others. When we consider our financial giving, it's the knowledge that others are benefitting that can make cheerfulness possible. With a foundation of generosity, givers need only to find out about needs. Arm-twisting or begging isn't necessary. We already have an attitude of willingness because we know, with God's help things will be OK.

NNEMAP Statistics for 2024

Check out these amazing statistics from the NNEMAP food pantry for 2024:

- 56,447 families/188,870 family members were served (approx. 25% increase over 2023)
- 14,984 unique families were served in which means that the average family came less than four times during the year
 - 8,331 home deliveries were made (21% increase over 2023)
- 3,167 families were served through the refrigerated locker program. (started in Feb 2023)
