

A Note from Your Pastor

We are about to enter into the season of Lent, the 40 days prior to Easter. Lent is considered a time of reflection, a time to prepare ourselves for the celebration of Easter. Many traditions include the practice of giving something up, mimicking Jesus' 40 days fasting in the wilderness. Current traditions also include adding something on – a spiritual disciple of reading a daily devotional or adding a time of prayer to your day. Regardless of the practice, this is a season when we try to increase our intentionality in studying and thinking about Jesus and the path of his life's ministry.

Because the crucifixion and death of Jesus is so central to the story of Holy Week, we also take this time to consider our own mortality – ashes to ashes, dust to dust. In addition, this year, I invite you to consider your life – your uniqueness, your gifts, your joy. Each of us is made with specialness in the eyes of God, each of us has a sparkle.

During our Ash Wednesday service, there will be an opportunity to receive either traditional ashes, or to receive glitter ashes. With the use of glitter ashes, we take this moment to not only make a statement of repentance, but also one of hope. Glitter is a symbol of beauty, joy, and celebration. Communities that "glitter" display grit, courage, and the power to flourish. By combining glitter with ashes, we are alerting the world to love, not to hate – to empower rather than to hurt one another.

As we journey through this season of Lent, may we not only repent, but may we also flourish. May we consider our foundation in dust and our aspirations to shine. May we tell the world that we are here to share God's love, God's grace, and God's glittering presence in our lives.

Thanks be to God for all the ways God has enabled us to sparkle.

Extravagant Generosity

2 Corinthians 13:5-9 Test yourselves to make sure you are solid in the faith. Don't drift along taking everything for granted. Give yourselves regular checkups. You need firsthand evidence, not mere hearsay, that Jesus Christ is in you. Test it out. If you fail the test, do something about it. I hope the test won't show that we have failed. But if it comes to that, we'd rather the test showed our failure than yours. We're rooting for the truth to win out in you. We couldn't possibly do otherwise. We don't just put up with our limitations; we celebrate them, and then go on to celebrate every strength, every triumph of the truth in you. We pray hard that it will all come together in your lives. (The Message)

It will soon be Lent, when Christians examine themselves and prepare for Easter. Paul was encouraging the Corinthians to do the same, in preparation for a third visit from him. Self examination is not easy. We don't like to face flaws, and often find it difficult to correct them.

But in relationship to Christ, this is exactly what we can successfully do. We can face our shortcomings and not bother with putting ourselves down. We simply turn them over to God and rejoice that He will forgive us and help us eliminate the faults.

With Christ in us, getting rid of shortcomings is still not easy, but certainly doable. And in the last verses of this passage, Paul encourages us to celebrate that we can turn them over to God and that we also have strengths and progress to be glad about.



Habitat for Humanity-Mid Ohio Happenings:

Our 2025 Partnership house begins!

Northwest Christian is again partnering with seven other area church's to build a house with Habitat for Humanity. We will start construction in late March in the Habitat warehouse building the walls. Then in early April we will start construction on site. Construction days will be Saturday's and Thursday morning's until the house is completed probably in August. We will be building a three bedroom two story house for Alamin and Tarikua and their two children. Alamin and Tarikua are refugees who have emigrated to the U.S. through the International Organization for Migration.

Partner Church's:- This is our 31st house with the partnership. Together we share construction and financial responsibility for this house with Habitat for Humanity-MidOhio and these partner churches:

> Covenant Presbyterian St Agatha Catholic St. Mark's Episcopal Atonement Lutheran

Riverside Church Holy Trinity Lutheran First Community

Location: This year's house is at 1493 Arlington Ave. in Linden. Our house last year was across the street at 1496 Arlington. These houses are part of an initiative with the city of Columbus to help revitalize the Linden neighborhood.

Volunteers needed: – It requires over 2,500 volunteer hours to build a house. Most work is performed on Saturday's and Thursday mornings. Workdays typically run from 8:30 am to mid afternoon and lunch is provided. Volunteers can come and go as their schedule permits. No experience is necessary. Please consider volunteering!
