ANote from Your Pastor

New Life

As we prepare for our Easter celebration, we are reminded that resurrection comes after death. We can't get to a glorious Easter morning and an empty tomb without passing through and experiencing the loss and pain of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. This year, we are again offering both a Maudy Thursday service and a Good Friday service.

Maundy Thursday is a time of remembering Jesus' commandment for us to love one another. Maundy comes from the same root as the word "mandate". Jesus gathered the disciples together, and in an act of extreme humbleness, servanthood, and love, he washed their feet. He then told them, "I've shown you want to do and how to do it. Love one another as I've loved you." This was his mandate. So we'll gather to remember that night. We'll gather in the Gathering Space off the Narthex at 6pm on Thursday, April 17 for a light meal together. Our meal will be our worship. We'll share some readings and some prayers. We'll share bread and cup. And we'll remember Christ's mandate to Love one another as Jesus loved us.

Good Friday we will hold our traditional Tenebrae service in the sanctuary at 7pm. We'll share song, prayer, and message, wrestling with how to interpret the meaning of the cross across multiple understandings. The Tenebrae service is a time of hearing the story of Jesus betrayal, desertion, and death amidst lowering light, ending in the darkness that surrounded Jesus' followers after his death. This is a time for contemplation and meditation.

And then...

Easter will come! We will celebrate the empty tomb and the new life we all find in the resurrected Christ!

We'll begin with an early service, outside if the weather permits, starting at 8am. Greet the glorious Easter morn with sunlight, song, and shared communion.

Easter Breakfast will be ready at 9am in the narthex. Come fellowship and enjoy time with old friends and new acquaintances. All are welcome!

Our traditional Easter service at 10:30 will include brass, celebration, and the Hallelujah Chorus.

New life comes after times of sadness, darkness, and death. That is the promise of resurrection. Thanks be to God!

Extravagant Generosity

Isaiah 53:5-6 The servant grew up before God—a scrawny seedling, a scrubby plant in a parched field. There was nothing attractive about him, nothing to cause us to take a second look. He was looked down on and passed over, a man who suffered, who knew pain firsthand. One look at him and people turned away. We looked down on him, thought he was scum. But the fact is, it was our pains he carried— our disfigurements, all the things wrong with us. We thought he brought it on himself, that God was punishing him for his own failures. But it was our sins that did that to him, that ripped and tore and crushed him—our sins! He took the punishment, and that made us whole. Through his bruises we get healed. We're all like sheep who've wandered off and gotten lost. We've all done our own thing, gone our own way. And God has piled all our sins, everything we've done wrong, on him, on him. (The Message)

As we approach Easter, we have the finest example possible of God's stewardship of His relationship to us. This description of Jesus's sacrifice proves God's love for us and what Love really means.

He was not only the equivalent of God's whistleblower to the religious authorities and was killed for telling the truth, His entire life was difficult on our behalf. Day after day — relating to people, bearing the burdens of others, giving of Himself to heal and to encourage.

This depth of understanding our plight and loving us out of that plight shows us what Holy Stewardship is all about. Seen in this light, it makes our efforts at stewardship of time, talents, and money seem quite doable. Hopefully, with God's help we can continue to be generous in our stewardship.



Eyewitness of the greatest single tragedy in American history the death of President Lincoln.

Today, 155 years after Mary Lincoln and her friend, Elizabeth Dixon witnessed the tragedy together, the story of their friendship is shared for the first time.

LOST + FOUND FRIENDSHIP offers us a rare glimpse into the lives of the Lincolns from a new vantage point.

Caroline has collected and researched family relics, letters, and keepsakes of Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln from the Civil War times and their time in Washington, D.C.
